I remember her going back to the hotel and working after long and tiring days of meetings or trainings to review an article, read master theses of her students, or organize an external lecturer's visit. This is probably possible because not only is she a quick thinker and decision-maker but also a person with a strong work ethic.

Ivana is a master of multitasking: she is probably the best I have ever seen. We might be discussing complex budgetary issues with her checking her emails in the meantime, but we could be sure that she did not miss any figure in the exercise. Furthermore, she is curious, always on the outlook for new projects for her students, faculty and larger community. She is also reliable and supportive: I could not send her an email without receiving an answer in a couple of hours, at most. And more often than not, these were complex issues which asked for complex explanations.

At the beginning of 2022, I left the Consortium to become the director of the Translation Centre for the Bodies of the European Union, an EU agency based in Luxembourg. This is where we met a couple of months ago. This was a very nice occasion to catch up on our personal and professional life. And I must say that I am still amazed at Ivana, at her incredible energy, perseverance, sense of humour as well as the quantity and quality of her work. It goes without saying that I feel immensely privileged to know her and to have had the chance to learn so much from her.
